<p>Feedback and analysis mechanism is in place relating to students feedback on efficacy of teaching learning technology adopted by faculty. The students feedback is collected digitally through the student portal. Prior to downloading Admit card, filling up the feedback form is mandatory. The feedback form can be found in the link: adtu.in/student/feedback.php After that the feedback is analysed automatically by the ERP Portal and is sent to The HR Department. The HR department takes suitable measures in consultation with the competent authority. The student feedback is useful to make need based changes for improvement of teaching learning technology. Students feedback system enable to understand his/her strength and weakness thereby take appropriate action for improvement. Moreover, there are various types of functional committees to perform specific roles. These committees sit as per pre-determined schedule to deliberate on issues relating to Admission, Examination, Grievance, Disciplinary Action, Research etc. where the representatives from Academic and Administrative sections participate and provide feedback on various issues. These committees take measures to resolve the issues raised. Similarly, Students Satisfaction Survey is periodically conducted and after analysis of feedback by IT division the same is reported to the competent authority for appropriate actions. Feedbacks from employer are usually taken by the placement cell and these feedbacks are helpful for the institution for up</p>

gradation/modification of existing facilities as well as creation of additional facilities.

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500

words)

The concept of participative management is widely practiced in the university. The Academic Council is the apex academic body of the University which coordinates and exercises the general supervision over the academic activities of the University. There are representatives from each Faculty of Studies as well as Administrative Department in the Academic Council. Academic matters are periodically discussed and resolved at the departmental level which is finally reported to the apex body for approval. Besides, there is an Academic Coordination Committee composed of representatives of all the Faculty of Studies to discuss and arrive at solutions relating to the ongoing issues and problems on weekly basis. The administration of the University is arranged in such a way that there is ample of opportunity for a bottom up participatory approach in the decision-making system. It starts with fact that the opinions of the Programme Co-ordinators are reflected in the wellbeing of the students and the day to day operational activities of the Programmes. The BoS of the department lets the involvement of the opinion of the PCs and the experts from industry as well the academia. The departmental activities are put through a regular participatory scrutiny and amendment for a continuous improvement via regular departmental meetings where again the opinions of the PC and the Departmental Heads are counted. During the last year too, there were regular meetings of the BoS, the departmental activities took place, and the minutes of these meetings were circulated to the concerned authorities for an overall improvement in the governance of the University. As a part of participative management Assam down town University has introduced Quality Circles covering all the departments. For the purpose of implementation, a package for implementation namely Quality Circle from "Introduction to Integration" was designed, and implemented. The implementation process is composed of Capacity building, Creation of an Organisation structure for implementation and monitoring. As a part of capacity building, top management exposition was done to enlighten the top and senior officers on the basic concept, philosophy and benefits of Quality Circle. For effective participation, a Steering Committee is formed headed by the Chancellor/ Vice Chancellor. The Steering Committee is responsible for monitoring and reviewing the functioning of Quality Circles with the assistance of the coordinating body. Functional heads are accountable for the healthy functioning of quality circles. These Quality Circles are working as a formal means for consultative participation, where employees can take part in decision making. These circles are formed with employees from different levels of the department who meet regularly to discuss ways of improvement of quality and resolve problems of their work area and suggest measures to the Management for improvement.

Examination and Evaluation

1. AdtU conducts examination and declare results strictly as per its Academic Calendar. 2. Progressive internal assessment, timely declaration of result and transparency are the special features of the examination process. 3. As mandated by academic regulation, external examiners for dissertations (PhD/PG/M.Tech) are appointed. 4. ERP is recently introduced in the examination system. 5. The teachers upload questions for the courses they teach, in the ERP. ERP generates question papers for the in semester and semester end examinations. 6. These question papers generated by the ERP are moderated by a team of moderators appointed by COE for maintaining quality.

Curriculum Development

1. There is periodic up gradation curriculum based upon the needs of the changing industrial/social scenario. 2. While developing the curriculum AdtU strictly adheres to the norms and regulations of various statutory bodies like UGC, AICTE, PCI, INC etc. Moreover, in designing the curriculum local, regional, national and global needs are taken into account. 3. Choice based credit courses are introduced in almost all the programmes. 4. Students are provided counselling to opt for suitable courses based upon aptitude and career goal. 5. Content of the syllabi are reviewed by board of studies talking into account the input from external experts.

Teaching and Learning

1. Academic Audit: IQAC conducts academic audit of its teaching departments and ensures to maintain a better teaching learning environment. 2. For the improvement of teaching learning and research environment as a part of strategic intent of Assam down town University, the IQAC, AdtU designed "AdtU model of teaching

learning and research". 3. Faculty excellence is given the highest priority which is the principal pathway of AdtU for achieving the long term aspiration. 4. ICT based classroom delivery: We ensure ICT based classroom delivery to enhance teaching learning by involving visual/graphical case studies. 5. Hiring of highly qualified and experienced faculty and on the job training for capacity building of faculties with respect to latest teaching learning technology are some of the measures adopted by AdtU.

Research and Development

1. The research and development activities of the University are looked after by the research cell headed by Dean of research. 2. The Cell encourages the faculty members to develop project proposals and submit them to different funding agencies to attract extramural funds. 3. Provisions for incentive is made for publications in UGC approved high impact factor journals. 4. Intramural Seed money grant is also provided to encourage research activities among the faculties. 5. Progress as well as fund utilization of both external and internal projects are closely monitored by committees under research cell. 6. In addition to that participation in seminar and conferences are also sponsored by the University.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

1. The HNDB Central Library of AdtU have a dedicated Library Management System (LMS) namely PRAN - (The soul of University) and is currently using its version 2.0. Through this LMS the book records, user records are maintained properly. 2. The LMS is also integrated with the transaction e-journal. The Faculty of Engineering Technology maintains its own e-journal. 3. University has installed CCTV cameras in Lecture theatres to strengthen university security management. 4. The students are encouraged to use ICT resources to utilize round the clock WIFI services. 5. IQAC ensures timely maintenance /repair of teaching / support infrastructure for quality delivery. 6. Extended hours are provided for effective uses of teaching learning resources.

Human Resource Management

1. University organizes FDPs to strengthen teaching learning and

academic administration. 2. University provides financial assistance to its faculty members for national and international events. 3. HR continuously replenishes domain experts by conducting selection process. 4. The University has laid down procedures for professional development activities such as publications, participation in national and international Seminar and Conferences by faculties. 5. Grievances from staff as well as students are given utmost priority and measures are taken for speedy redressal of grievances. Welfare measures for employees are in place and there is provision for interest free loans. The promotion policy as set by the UGC is implemented in letter and spirit.

Admission of Students

1. University has received overwhelming response due to increase in admission applications across the country with foreign nationals. 2. University has initiated school/college connect programme and career counselling. It helps students/parents in taking decisions for their right progression. 3. University faculty members have offered expert lecture in in frontier areas to aware new generation. 4. Applications received within the specified period for a specific programme of study is considered on the basis of eligibility criteria laid down and availability of seat. In case of international students, the last date is 30th September, although applicants are encouraged to apply as early as possible.
