Feedback Obtained

Feedback and analysis mechanism is in place relating to students feedback on efficacy of teaching learning technology adopted by faculty. After analysis of the feedback by IT division the same is reported to the HR department. The HR department takes suitable measures in consultation with the competent authority. The student feedback is useful to make need based changes for improvement of teaching learning technology. Students feedback system enable to understand his/her strength and weakness thereby take appropriate action for improvement. Moreover there are various types of functional committees to perform specific roles. These committees sit as per pre-determined schedule to deliberate on issues relating to Admission, Examination, Grievance, Disciplinary Action, Research etc where the representatives from Academic and Administrative sections participate and provide feedback on various issues. These committees take measures to resolve the issues raised. Similarly Students Satisfaction Survey is periodically conducted and after analysis of feedback by IT division the same is reported to the competent authority for appropriate actions. Feedbacks from employer are usually taken by the placement cell and there feedbacks are helpful for the institution for up gradation/modification of existing facilities as well as creation of additional facilities.

CRITERION VI – GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

<p>Assam down town University follows the concept of selective decentralization. Decision making power is delegated to some units within the institution. While semester end examinations are conducted by the office of the Controller of Examination, the Faculty of studies are empowered to conduct the in semester</p>

examinations as per the Academic Calendar. Besides all practical examinations are conducted at the faculty level. The concept of participative management is widely practised in the university. The Academic Council is the apex academic body of the University which coordinates and exercises the general supervision over the academic activities of the University. There is representation from the Faculty of Studies as well as Administrative Department in the Academic Council. Many academic matters are periodically discussed and resolved at the departmental level. The departmental committees report to the faculty level committees and finally to the apex body for approval. For example the Board of Studies take certain decisions relating to academic matters and finally places it to Academic Council for approval. Besides, there is an Academic Coordination Committee composed of representatives of all the Faculty of Studies to discuss and arrive at solutions relating to the ongoing issues and problems on weekly basis. As a part of participative management Assam down town University introduced Quality Circles covering all the departments and sections of the University. For the purpose of implementation, a package for implementation namely Quality Circle from "Introduction to Integration" was designed, and implemented. The implementation process is composed of Capacity building, Creation of an Organisation structure for implementation and monitoring. As a part of capacity building, top management exposition was done to enlighten the top and senior officers on the basic concept, philosophy and benefits of Quality Circle. (Refer Memo no.: AdtU/DQP/2017/002 and Date: 25/05/2017). For effective participation, a Steering Committee is formed headed by the Chancellor/ Vice Chancellor. The Managing Trustee, Additional Registrar, Deputy Registrar (Academic) and Finance and Accounts Officer are the members of the Steering Committee. Department of Quality Process coordinates its activities. (Memo no.: AdtU/DQP/2017/009 and Date: 02/12/2017). The Steering Committee is responsible for monitoring and reviewing the functioning of Quality Circles with the assistance of the coordinating body. Functional heads are accountable for the healthy functioning of quality circles. As on date 20 (twenty) numbers of Quality Circles have been formed, which are vibrant. These Quality Circles are working as a formal means for consultative participation, where employees can take part in decision making. These circles are formed with employees from different levels of the department who meet regularly to discuss ways of improvement of quality and resolve problems of their work area and suggest measures to the Management for improvement.

Admission of Students	The admission cycle at ADTU formally starts on the first Monday of April. Application for admission to different programme of both UG and PG is entertained till 30th July. In case of nursing however the last date is 30th of September. Applications received within the specified period for a specific programme of study is considered on the basis of eligibility criteria laid down and availability of seat. In case of international students, the last date is 30th September, although applicants are

	encouraged to apply as early as possible.
Human Resource Management	The University has laid down procedures for professional development activities such as publications, participation in national and international Seminar and Conferences by faculties. Organizing Orientation and Induction programme as per guidelines of statutory bodies are strictly followed. While faculties are encouraged for PhD, there is also provision of incentive for paper publication. Grievances from staff as well as students are given utmost priority and measures are taken for speedy redressal of grievances. Welfare measures for employees are in place and there is provision for interest free loans. The promotion policy as set by the UGC is implemented in letter and spirit.
Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation	The HNDB Central Library of AdtU have a dedicated Library Management System (LMS) namely PRAN - (The soul of University) and is currently using its version 2.0. Through this LMS the book records, user records are maintained properly. The LMS is also integrated with the transaction e-journal. The Faculty of Engineering Technology maintains its own e-journal. Assam down town University has more than 400 computers for the students. There are more than 50 numbers of information and communication technology enabled class rooms. Class notes are also maintained through a dedicated digital repository system.
Research and Development	The research and development activities of the University are looked after by the research cell headed by Dean of research. It encourages the faculty members to develop project proposals and submit them to different funding agencies to attract extramural funds. Provisions for incentive is made for publications in UGC approved high impact factor journals. Intramural Seed money grant is also provided to encourage research activities among the faculties. Progress as well as fund utilization of both external and internal projects are closely monitored by committees under research cell. In addition to that participation in seminar and conferences are also sponsored by the University.

<p>Teaching and Learning</p>	<p>For the improvement of teaching learning and research environment as a part of strategic intent of Assam down town University, the IQAC, AdtU designed "AdtU model of teaching learning and research". Faculty excellence is given the highest priority which is the principal pathway of AdtU for achieving the long term aspiration. Hiring of highly qualified and experienced faculty and on the job training for capacity building of faculties with respect to latest teaching learning technology are some of the measures adopted by AdtU. This strategic intent is also reflected in the trend of recruitment of faculties.</p>
<p>Curriculum Development</p>	<p>While developing the curriculum AdtU strictly adheres to the norms and regulations of various statutory bodies like UGC, AICTE, PCI, INC etc. Moreover in designing the curriculum local, regional, national and global needs are taken into account. Choice based credit courses are introduced in almost all the programmes. Students are provided counseling to opt for suitable courses based upon aptitude and career goal. There is periodic up gradation curriculum based upon the needs of the changing industrial/social scenario. Content of the syllabi are reviewed by board of studies talking into account the input from external experts.</p>
<p>Examination and Evaluation</p>	<p>AdtU conducts examination and declare results strictly as per its Academic Calendar. Progressive internal assessment, timely declaration of result and transparency are the special features of the examination process. As mandated by academic regulation, external examiners for dissertations (PhD/PG/M.Tech) are appointed. ERP is recently introduced in the examination system. The teachers upload questions for the courses they teach, in the ERP. ERP generates question papers for the in semester and semester end examinations. These question papers generated by the ERP are moderated by a team of moderators appointed by COE for maintaining quality.</p>
<p>Industry Interaction / Collaboration</p>	<p>Industry academia interaction is made inbuilt into the curriculum. Workshop and Seminars are conducted where resource persons drawn from industry and academia participate. Awareness</p>

programme like 'Industry 4' is organized for students to create proper mindset of students to face the forthcoming challenges. Deliberations with local industries as well as industry internship are emphasized. For meaningful interaction and collaboration with industries, Centre for Innovation Incubation and Entrepreneurship, Intellectual property right cell are in place and functioning. Policy for startup is in place and under operation. Process for establishment of centre of excellence under 'Industry 4' is initiated.

Assam down town University implemented the project on renewable energy with a capacity of 200 KWP grid connected solar PV power plant in the campus. More than 16 of the power requirement of the Institution is met from the solar power plant. Besides eco-friendly practice of the University includes i. The design of the buildings is made in a way to utilize natural light and air. ii. The entire area of the cafeteria is designed in a way that it is well lighted and ventilated. iii. Most of the conventional electrical bulbs are replaced by the low energy consumption LED bulbs. iv. A culture of awareness is created to switch off lights and other electrical appliances after use. As a part of its effort for Carbon Neutrality the following steps are taken. i. Plantation of trees in the campus ii. Using dry leaves for preparation of manure iii. Creation of kitchen gardens in the campus iv. No plastic zone v. With the objective of achieving the goal of paperless office attempt are made to reduce the use of paper

- Hazardous Waste Management: The laboratories follow proper method of disposal of chemicals and other hazardous wastes.
